November 23, 2025 (Christ the King C) Luke 23:33-43

Not <u>EVERYONE</u> who takes up a life of crime is all that <u>SMART</u>. Sometimes movies or television <u>GLORIFY</u> criminals. They make them appear sophisticated, even <u>COOL</u>. But <u>MOST</u> criminals don't even come close. Just do an internet search for "stupid criminals," and you'll see what I mean.

Like the guy who walked into a little corner store with a shotgun, and demanded all the cash from the register. After the cashier put the money in a bag, the robber saw a bottle of <u>SCOTCH</u> on the shelf <u>BEHIND</u> the counter. He told the cashier to put <u>IT</u> in the bag as well, but the cashier refused and said, "I don't believe you're over 21." The robber said he was, but the clerk <u>STILL</u> said he didn't believe him. So, the robber took out his <u>DRIVER'S</u> license and gave it to the clerk. The clerk looked it over, and agreed that the man was indeed over 21, and he put the scotch in the bag. The robber ran from the store with his loot, and the cashier promptly called the. They arrested him two hours later. Not the sharpest tool in the shed.

In 2008, a man named Ruben Zarate attempted to rob a muffler shop in Chicago. After demanding money, he was told that most of the cash was stored in a safe that could only be opened by the manager, who wasn't scheduled to come in until a few hours later. To save himself some trouble, Zarate left his cell phone number for the store to call him <u>BACK</u> once the manager arrived. Of course, the store called the police first. Not the brightest bulb on the tree.

In 2010, Albert Bailey and an accomplice decided to rob a <u>BANK</u> in Fairfield, Connecticut. But in an attempt to speed up the process of the crime, Bailey called the bank in <u>ADVANCE</u> to let them know that they were coming to rob it, you know, to give the bank <u>TIME</u> to get the money <u>READY</u>, so he could just pick it up and leave <u>QUICKLY</u>. Of course, it wasn't the money that was waiting for him when he arrived. Not the fastest car on the track.

The Gospels tell of <u>ANOTHER</u> stupid criminal. Jesus was hung on a cross between <u>TWO</u> criminals. And according to Luke's Gospel, <u>ONE</u> of the thieves <u>JOINED</u> the mob that was <u>MOCKING</u> Jesus. He hurled insults at Jesus: "Aren't you the Christ? Save yourself and us!"

Of course, some criminals are <u>SMARTER</u> than others. The <u>OTHER</u> criminal had a better <u>GRASP</u> of what was happening. He rebuked his partner in crime. "Don't you fear God," he said, "We are getting what our deeds deserve. But this man has done nothing wrong."

Then he turned to our Lord and said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." And <u>THAT REQUEST</u> might be the <u>GREATEST ACT</u> of <u>FAITH</u> in <u>ALL</u> of scripture. Because, what is it <u>BASED</u> on? What does he <u>SEE</u> on that cross? What <u>EVIDENCE</u> does he <u>HAVE</u>?

He sees a man he has <u>NEVER MET</u>, a <u>STRANGER</u>. He sees a person so <u>BEATEN</u> and <u>BLOODIED</u>, that he's nearly unrecognizable. He sees a man much <u>NEARER</u> to death than he is, because he'd <u>ALREADY</u> been beaten and flogged, nearly to the <u>POINT</u> of <u>DEATH</u>. He sees a man that didn't have the <u>STRENGTH</u> to <u>CARRY</u> his cross to Golgotha. The soldiers made <u>ANOTHER</u> man help him. He sees a man <u>MOCKED</u> and <u>INSULTED</u> as he <u>DIES HELPLESSLY</u>.

And yet, he sees something <u>MORE</u> than that. He hears Jesus say, "Father, forgive them for they know not what they do." <u>WHO DOES</u> that? Who <u>FORGIVES</u> his <u>MURDERERS AS</u> he <u>DIES?</u> <u>WHO DOES</u> that? <u>JESUS</u> does that. And this criminal knows <u>IMMEDIATELY</u> that this mysterious figure, that they keep CALLING the MESSIAH, is NO ORDINARY MAN.

This <u>CRIMINAL</u>, hanging on his <u>OWN</u> cross <u>NEXT</u> to Jesus, sees the <u>TRUTH</u>. He sees <u>MORE</u> than the <u>OBVIOUS</u>, more than <u>ANYONE ELSE</u> can see, more than even the <u>DISCIPLES</u>, who had given up hope and <u>ABANDONED</u> him – he has the <u>FAITH</u> to <u>SEE</u> and <u>BELIEVE</u> that this <u>DYING</u> <u>JESUS</u> is the one who <u>WILL SAVE</u> the <u>WORLD</u>. "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom."

The contrasts of this moment <u>COULDN'T BE ANY STARKER</u>. People that had only <u>DAYS EARLIER</u> waved palm branches and proclaimed him <u>KING</u> as he <u>ENTERED</u> Jerusalem, were now <u>MOCKING</u> him <u>OUTSIDE</u> the city, calling for his <u>EXECUTION</u>.

In a place reserved for criminals, hangs the **INNOCENT** one.

In the midst of his **SUFFERING**, Jesus promises a place in **PARADISE**.

In a place dedicated to <u>DEATH</u>, Jesus promised <u>LIFE</u> and <u>HOPE</u>.

The soldiers MOCK Jesus by hanging him <u>BETWEEN</u> two criminals, like a king between two cabinet members, not realizing that THIS CROSS IS Jesus' THRONE.

Like Peter's <u>DENIALS</u> earlier, they <u>INSULT</u> him <u>3 TIMES</u>. The leaders <u>SCOFFED</u> at him, saying, "He saved others; let him save himself <u>IF HE IS</u> the Messiah of God, his chosen one!" The <u>SOLDIERS MOCKED</u> him, "<u>IF YOU ARE</u> the King of the Jews, save yourself!" Even one of the <u>CRIMINALS</u> derided him, "<u>ARE YOU NOT</u> the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" <u>THREE TIMES</u>, they <u>ALL</u> say the <u>SAME</u> thing: "<u>SAVE YOURSELF</u>" – the <u>SAME</u> thing the <u>DEVIL</u> said back at the BEGINNING of this gospel – AVOID the pain and suffering of the cross.

But Jesus <u>WON'T DO</u> that. He <u>REFUSES</u> to come in <u>POWER</u>, to even <u>DEFEND</u> himself, but INSTEAD comes in COMPLETE VULNERABILITY.

He <u>REFUSES</u> to call down <u>VENGEANCE</u> on his tormentors, but <u>INSTEAD</u>, <u>FORGIVES</u> them.

He <u>REFUSES</u> to come <u>DOWN FROM</u> his cross to <u>PROVE</u> his kingly status, but <u>INSTEAD</u> <u>SUBMITS</u> to that instrument of torture and humiliation.

They put up a sign over his head that said, "This is the King of the Jews." They were making <u>FUN</u> of him, but <u>NONE</u> of them <u>REALIZED</u> that <u>IN</u> their mockery, <u>EVERY WORD THEY SAID</u> was ACTUALLY the TRUTH. He IS the Christ. He IS the King.

I love this quote from James Alison (Jesus the Forgiving Victim; Listening for the Unheard Voice).

The cross is Jesus saying,"...the only way I can get it across to you that I <u>LIKE</u> you is by occupying the very <u>WORST</u> space that <u>ANY</u> of you can come up with, a place which you typically think <u>I</u> like to put people in. I <u>DON'T</u>. It's <u>YOU</u> who put people there, <u>YOU</u> at your very <u>WORST</u>. I'll <u>OCCUPY</u> that space, to show you that I'm <u>NOT</u> out to <u>GET</u> you, that I <u>REALLY DO LIKE</u> you."

It's said that the <u>WEAKEST</u> thing there <u>IS</u> in our world is to <u>DIE</u>, but the most <u>POWERFUL</u> thing that <u>JESUS</u> did, the most powerful thing he <u>COULD'VE</u> done, was to <u>DIE</u>. And not just <u>ANY</u> death; he died a <u>CRIMINAL'S</u> death, a <u>HUMILIATING</u> death. Christ's <u>WEAKNESS COULD</u> have been the <u>END</u> of <u>CHRISTIANITY</u>, but <u>INSTEAD</u>, it <u>WAS</u> the <u>BEGINNING</u>. Christ's weakness <u>COULD</u> have proved that he WASN'T the Messiah, but INSTEAD it proved that he WAS the Messiah.

In <u>WEAKNESS</u>, in the weakness of being <u>BORN</u> as a <u>CHILD</u>, in the weakness of being <u>COMPLETELY DEPENDENT</u> upon his <u>MOTHER</u> and upon <u>GOD</u>, in the <u>FOOLISHNESS</u> of the <u>CROSS</u>, <u>THERE IS POWER</u>; there's <u>LIFE</u>. <u>IN JESUS</u>, God comes to us <u>IN OUR HUMAN</u> <u>WEAKNESS</u>, because we don't have the <u>POWER</u> to come to <u>GOD OURSELVES</u>.

We have a king that came to <u>US</u>, so that we could <u>SEE</u> God, see what <u>LOVE LOOKS</u> like.

We have a king that made HIMSELF WEAK so that WE could be STRONG;

a king that <u>DIED</u> so that <u>WE</u> could <u>LIVE</u>;

a king who refused to save HIMSELF, so that he could save US INSTEAD.

We need to remember that <u>CRIMINAL</u>, who saw Jesus at his <u>WEAKEST</u>, and realized that this is <u>PRECISELY WHERE GOD MEETS</u> us. Precisely <u>IN</u> our <u>WEAKEST</u> moments – in our failures, in our pain, in our sadness, in our grief, in our brokenness, <u>THAT'S</u> where God meets. In the <u>REAL</u> world, in OUR world, because Jesus comes to US. THAT'S the kind of king we have.

Jesus comes to <u>US</u>. All <u>WE</u> need to do ... is <u>CRY</u> out like that criminal on his cross, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." Amen.
