

There is a story of a young boy who was starting to understand what communion was. In his church, children remained in their seats as the adults went forward to receive the bread and wine. This boy had reached the age when he was increasingly curious about this whole business and watched the adults, particularly his mother, very closely. When his mother returned to their pew, she knelt for a moment in solemn prayer. Then she sat back next to her son. He

smelled something sweet and wonderful. He asked his mother, "What is that smell?" She turned and said, "What smell, son?" When she spoke, he realized it was on her breath. "What is inside you?" She knew she could not explain it all, so she simply said, "Oh son, that's Jesus. You smell Jesus." This answer was enough for him, and the smell was so good that he learned into his mother and knew that just being next to her meant that he had Jesus too.

When I talk with First Communion students about receiving the bread and wine, I ask them what people look like when they take communion. Over the years, most of the responses are that people look very serious, sometimes sad. One student thought that some even looked mad.

What do we receive with communion? And what is our response to such gifts? Martin Luther tells us in the Small Catechism that we receive the gifts of forgiveness, life and salvation. Big words for the children of God to understand at any age. For sure, the little boy in the story was on to something – Jesus is ever nearer to us as we receive the bread and wine or a blessing at the Lord's table. The young boy's response to this revelation was to lean into his mother and delight in having Jesus so close to him that he could smell him.

Most of us grew up being told that communion is serious business. We need to reflect on our sins and our unworthiness before God. We need to remember that Jesus chose to die so that we could be forgiven, and he gave us the gift of this meal so that we might taste and see how good the Lord is to us. And this is all exactly true. We come the altar by God's grace, because we could never earn a place at God's table.

But after we have been invited, after we have come forward, after we have received God's gifts for us - how do we respond? The old song says that we "Thank the Lord and sing his praise. Tell everyone what he has done." There is joy in having received Jesus and all his love. We do sing and invite one another to join us in thanking and praising God. After all, it is God who has done the gracious giving in Communion. And the gift is so great – we as receivers are grateful, and we experience again how good and great our God is to us.

Perhaps our hearts have not caught up with the gift by the time we return to our seats. But we than the Lord and sing his praise with shouts of joy anyway. We lean into the promise, as the young boy learned into his mother. We sing, because we know, as he did, that we are ever nearer to Jesus. And by the grace of God, we will grow to understand and rejoice in this good and wonderful gift.

May God inspire our songs and lead us into the joy of his presence and the joy of telling about his grace for all.

# Sensory Changes of Aging

Aging is a continuous process beginning at birth and ending with death. Age related sensory changes occur gradually and vary between persons. After age 62, aging interferes with bodily functions. We have five senses that provide a means of learning, security and safety, mobility, communication, and enjoyment.

- 1. Vision helps with learning, safety, and mobility.
- 2. Hearing enables us to communicate and interact socially, learn, and protect ourselves.
- 3. Taste lets us enjoy eating and choose foods according to body needs and preferences.
- 4. Smell provides a means for safety, emotional life, digestion, memories, and pleasure.
- 5. Touch provides a means for safety, emotional life, and pleasure.

Persons with sensory deprivation find it difficult to concentrate, may become bored, have a short attention span, or may become confused. Stronger stimuli are needed in all five senses as we age. Greater contrasts facilitate use of our five senses. Processing of senses takes longer. Compensating with other senses helps if one sense is lost. Changes can lead to social isolation and depression. The environment influences the person's ability to cope. A detailed handout is available near the nurses' office.

In my first parish, a man from Detroit Lakes bought a farm on a lake from two bachelor brothers. He stipulated that they could continue living on the farm while he built a house and garage on the lake. The new owner asked the brothers if they had made any arrangements for their estates when they died. No, they hadn't and despite the owner's encouragement, the two brothers refused to make any plans.

Their estates went to the State of Minnesota. That is not a bad thing but at the same time, they could have planned to create some lasting effects of their lives. They could have become "heroic donors" so to speak, by taking time to consider what was important to them and helping fund that into the future. Maybe that was the state of Minnesota. Or maybe it was just not taking time to think more deeply about what was important to them and their faith.

In 2018, the five people on the Mission Endowment Fund Committee took a bold step and decided to invest the principle of the fund in Thrivent Charitable. They could have invested in other funds, that is not the issue; but they decided that their responsibility to those who had donated to the fund required they look for more aggressive or money-earning opportunities. The result would then generate more money for use as grants. That has happened.

What do you want to do with your financial estate? What is important to you and do you want to help fund that into the future? The Mission Endowment Fund Committee has resources that you can look over and decide if they will help you be a donor into the future, touching lives with your life's resources.

Annual Appeal – An advisory board is being recruited to meet for two times to think about our Annual Appeal. The goal is to get a range of ages and backgrounds representing the congregation as we move forward to the fall campaign or program.

## Mud on my Boots on Ash Wednesday

Cleaning the mud off my boots after a recent flood response, I noticed the grittiness of it.

It reminded me of preparing the ashes for Ash Wednesday. Burning last year's celebratory palms, sieving them fine, mixing them with oil.

I see the impermanence of things, of even life itself, in the mud and ashes.

Ash Wednesday, a day when we acknowledge our mortality and our own return to dust.

Mucking out after a flood, removing what was once treasure that has now become trash.

Too often we overlook the physicality of the Christian faith in our anticipation of Heaven. We focus on the promise of our spiritual future, and, yes, that will be a wonderful thing. No more tears and reunions of all sorts. Wholeness that we can only wonder and dream about.

And yet, though we worship and celebrate God With Us, a peculiar God that took on the stuff of their own creation to be with their creation, we sometimes forget that there is more to the promise than "pie in the sky, by and by".

The Kingdom of God is now, in the wine and bread, in the water and ashes, in our call to serve and love our neighbor.

The Kingdom of God is even found in flood mud.

No, really.

When we are more like Christ, do we become more human or less?

I believe we become more human, specifically, we become the humanity that God hoped we would be. Loving, caring, invested in one another's well-being. Trusting in the abundance of God.


Watch what happens after a flood. Neighbors take each other in and make sure everyone is accounted for. Strangers show up to clean out houses, to offer hugs and listening hearts. Food is shared. Help is accepted and reciprocated. Communities mourn their losses as communities.

To quote a recent Welch, WV flood survivor: "We become human again."

When we take on the ashes of Ash Wednesday or the mud from another flood, we become human again. We recognize our place in the Kingdom; we accept the invitation to participate in it.

Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return. Now, go out there and get muddy.


