January 22, 2023 (2nd Sunday after the Epiphany, Year A) Given on 3rd Sunday after Epiphany because of text switch last week John 1:29-42

Jesus asked, "What are you looking for?"

That's a really good question. What <u>ARE</u> we looking for?

I think most of us aren't <u>SURE</u> what we're looking for. We have some <u>GENERAL IDEA</u> of what we need, but we can't quite put our finger on it.

It's true spiritually too. We know that we need a savior, but we're not quite sure what that <u>MEANS</u>. Are we looking for a rescuer? A conqueror? A friend? A confidant? Maybe <u>ALL</u> those things?

John the Baptist and his two disciples weren't sure either. Now you'd think that, of <u>ALL</u> people, John the Baptist would know who Jesus was. He was Jesus' cousin. He had recognized him in the womb. But <u>TWICE</u> he says in this story (<u>TWICE</u> for emphasis), "I did <u>NOT</u> know him! My whole ministry was anticipating him, but I didn't <u>KNOW</u> him!" The Baptist is the "voice crying out in the wilderness." He <u>KNOWS</u> that the world as we know it isn't as God intended it to be, and God is bringing in something far <u>GREATER</u>, but he can't quite make it out. Even the <u>BAPTIST</u> needs someone to bring him to Jesus, so <u>GOD</u> does; <u>GOD</u> pointed him out: "He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit." And then, <u>HAVING</u> seen, he says, "And I <u>MYSELF</u> have seen and have <u>TESTIFIED</u> that this is the Son of God."

And the Baptist's <u>DISCIPLES</u> aren't sure either. John <u>TELLS</u> them that Jesus is "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world," and they're following him, but they're kind of unsure (look over shoulder) tentative, cautious. Jesus turns around and notices them following and says, "What are you looking for?"

He asks <u>US</u> too: "What <u>ARE</u> you looking for?" He <u>COULD</u> have said, you and <u>I</u> might have said, "What do you <u>WANT</u>?" But <u>JESUS</u> says, "What are you <u>LOOKING</u> for?" That's a <u>DIFFERENT</u> question, a <u>LOT DEEPER</u> question. The very <u>FIRST</u> words he says to his <u>FIRST</u> two followers cut RIGHT to the heart.

Sheepishly they respond, "Well, Rabbi, where are you staying?" On one level that means, "Where do you live?" But do you think that in a few hours they'd be running to tell others that he was the Messiah, if all that had happened was, "Well, I've got my tent set up under a tree over there"?

Jesus knew what they were <u>REALLY</u> asking. "Where are you working? What kinds of things are you doing? We'd like to know what this all is about before we get too close." And Jesus responds, "Come and see."

And they did. They spent the whole <u>DAY</u> with him, and by that night, they knew for <u>THEMSELVES</u> who he was, and they weren't afraid to <u>SAY</u> it: "We have found the Messiah."

What are we <u>LOOKING</u> for? We're looking for the <u>LORD</u>. We want to see something that really matters in this world. We want to see what FAITH LOOKS like.

You see, to really <u>KNOW</u> Jesus, you have to see him at <u>WORK</u>, and you <u>CAN'T</u> see Jesus at work from a distance. Like the two disciples, we need to get <u>INVOLVED</u>. To see Jesus working, we have to get right in the <u>MIDDLE</u> of it. And then, we can see it for <u>OURSELVES</u>. Only when <u>WE</u> work for a world of hope and peace, can we see <u>JESUS</u> working in the world.

He says, "Come and see."

Joanna Adams was a gifted Presbyterian minister in Atlanta, and for a while she was in charge of a homeless shelter in one of the downtown churches. In Atlanta, there was a Christian radio station that had a talk show hosted by a sort of religious Rush Limbaugh, and he interviewed Joanna about

the night shelter. She described the ministry, "We take in homeless people; we provide lodging and food."

He was clearly suspicious. "What has this got to do with the gospel of Jesus Christ?"

"Well," she said, "we try to show the compassion of Christ's guidance."

"You didn't hear my question. What has this got to do with the gospel of Jesus Christ?"

"Well, we try to take care of not only their physical needs," said Joanna, "but also their spiritual needs – we try to show them compassion. We're concerned for them as human beings."

"You're not listening to my question. I want to know where is Jesus Christ in all that?"

Joanna thought for a minute and then she said, "You just have to be there to know what I'm talking about. You would just have to <u>SEE</u> it for yourself."

That's sort of what today's gospel means. If we want to <u>SEE JESUS</u>, we have to go where Jesus <u>IS</u>, <u>WATCH</u> what Jesus is <u>DOING</u>, and <u>DO</u> what <u>JESUS DOES</u>. Come and see.

Let me tell you about a congregation I know well, that helped <u>SHAPE</u> me as a pastor. Back then, they were a <u>GROWING</u> congregation, because their members, and <u>ESPECIALLY</u> their young families and children, were <u>EXCITED</u> about what was happening there, and they were <u>INVITING</u> their friends. It seemed like every couple <u>WEEKS</u> they added <u>ANOTHER</u> child, because one of their friends had <u>INVITED</u> them. Their Youth Director always had kids walking up to her and saying, "I want to come <u>TOO!</u>" I remember hearing about <u>ONE</u> of the kids whose <u>PUNISHMENT</u> one week was that he <u>COULDN'T</u> go to church.

I've been introducing Dante, our new Youth Coordinator, to all the things that we do in this church. There was a Tuesday when there were 5 different activities happening simultaneously in the building. He couldn't believe it. On Wednesday evenings, we go from Coffeehouse to Wednesday night faith with 5th and 6th graders, to Sport Court time with the 7th and 8th graders, then the 9th graders join in for the worship and meal, and that's <u>BEFORE</u> we even <u>START</u> Affirmation classes. In the last few weeks, we've added a couple new students to the Peer Ministry class. Dante is already making an impact. Those new kids came because they were invited to come and see by their friends.

What do people "come and see" here at <u>FIRST</u>? Do they see our desire to grow closer to God? Do they see that we're warm and friendly here? Do they see that people are fed and cared for here? Do they see that we have a generous heart and a spirit of service to our community and to the world? Yes, we hope so.

But it's not really about <u>US</u>, it's about <u>JESUS</u>, and what <u>HE'S</u> doing <u>THROUGH</u> us. The invitation is to come and see the <u>LORD</u>. Come and see what <u>JESUS</u> is doing. Come and touch the waters of new life. Come and hear the words of good news. Come and taste the bread of life and the cup of mercy. With these things Jesus changes lives.

What are **YOU** looking for? Do you want to see **JESUS**? Come and see.

The Lord is alive and working. The Lord is <u>HERE</u>, in this <u>PLACE</u>. We are God's <u>WITNESSES</u> to that. But no one will <u>KNOW</u> it if we don't <u>TELL</u> someone.

Imagine what this place would look like if <u>EACH</u> of us invited just <u>ONE</u> other person to come to church with us, just ONE! There might even be someone in FRONT ROW if we did that!

What Jesus is doing in the place is <u>EXCITING</u>, and people need to <u>SEE</u> it, because they need to see JESUS.

So go from this place this week and <u>INVITE</u> someone: "Come and see. Come and see what JESUS is DOING here." Amen.
