## Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

August 21, 2021(Proper 16, Year C) Luke 13:10-17

It says, "The difference between me and you is you use scripture to determine what love means, and I use love to determine what scripture means."

The woman Jesus meets in our Gospel today would say, "It's a TREMENDOUS difference."

So, let's take a closer look at these two people. First the woman. Jesus was teaching in a synagogue when she appeared with a spirit that had crippled her for 18 years. She was bent over and couldn't stand up straight. I wonder if the spirit's <a href="NAME">NAME</a> was scoliosis. Or perhaps osteoporosis. Or maybe it wasn't just physical.

I heard of a woman who described herself as "the incredible shrinking woman." Her marriage was falling apart. Their business was going broke. Her three young children were demanding more time than she had to give. One had learning disabilities. She was seeing her life disappear. She no longer knew who she was. Could that have been the plight of the "bent-over" woman? Was she a "shrinking"?

Or maybe the demon name was depression, or guilt, or shame, or addiction, or fear, or resentment. WHATEVER it WAS that KEPT her eyes on the ground, Jesus describes her condition as being in BONDAGE. So, if YOU'VE ever needed to be HEALED, if you've had LONG ordeals in your life that were such a BURDEN that you felt BENT OVER by the WEIGHT of it, then you might see YOURSELF in this woman.

And one of the <u>AMAZING</u> things about this story is that the woman never <u>ASKED</u> to be healed! In numerous <u>OTHER</u> stories in the gospels, people <u>ASK</u>, or their <u>FRIENDS</u> ask <u>FOR</u> them, or their parents or family ask. Or sometimes they make such a nuisance of themselves that it's <u>OBVIOUS</u> that they need some help. But not so with <u>THIS</u> woman. Jesus just <u>HEALS</u> her, <u>WITHOUT</u> her even <u>ASKING</u> for it. Jesus saw her bent over, and he touched her, and "immediately she stood up straight and began to praise God."

It's as if Jesus is saying, "I <u>SEE</u> you. I see your <u>PAIN</u>. I see what you're <u>GOING</u> through. And I want you to know that I'm <u>HERE</u>. And I <u>LOVE</u> you."

There is tremendous <u>POWER</u> in just <u>BEING SEEN</u>, being <u>KNOWN</u>, being <u>LOVED</u>, being <u>ACCEPTED</u>.

And Jesus goes a step further. Not only does Jesus <u>HEAL</u> her, he <u>RESTORES</u> her to her <u>COMMUNITY</u>. Here is a woman who, for <u>18 LONG</u> years, has been <u>BLAMED</u> for her <u>OWN</u> illness, who at <u>BEST</u> was <u>INVISIBLE</u>, considered <u>USELESS</u>, <u>NOTHING</u>, and at <u>WORST</u>, <u>JUDGED</u> and <u>EXCLUDED</u>. But <u>JESUS</u> gives her a <u>NAME</u>. He calls her by a highly <u>COMPLEMENTARY</u> title, "Daughter of Abraham." Very much like the term we <u>CHRISTIANS</u> use, "Child of God."

"Child of God, I SEE you."

But the leader of the <u>SYNAGOGUE</u> – he couldn't <u>SEE</u> this <u>MIRACLE</u>; all <u>HE</u> saw was somebody breaking a rule, and he was indignant. He kept saying to the crowd over and over, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be healed, and not on the Sabbath day."

I'd like you to see something.

We agree with that so much <u>HERE</u> that when we built this sanctuary, we took some of the church pews out entirely, and put in chairs.

You know, Facebook is in an interesting place to have discussions. I have been in many disagreements with other pastors about the <u>STRICT ENFORCEMENT OF RULES</u>. They say "if a child isn't old enough, they can't commune"; "if a person hasn't been baptized, they can't commune"; "if a person isn't a member, they can't get married in a church." And I say, "look at <u>JESUS</u>." Jesus <u>NEVER REFUSED</u> grace to <u>ANYONE</u>.

Jesus understood the Sabbath as <u>MORE</u> than a tradition. For Jesus, the Sabbath was the symbol of God's <u>POWER</u>, of the <u>PERFECTION</u> of creation, of <u>WHOLENESS</u>. What more <u>APPROPRIATE</u> gesture could there <u>BE</u> than to <u>RESTORE</u> wholeness to one of God's <u>CHILDREN</u> ON that Sabbath.

This <u>DAY</u>, and <u>PARTICULARLY WORSHIP</u>, is not intended to <u>KEEP</u> you <u>COMFORTABLE</u>. There's a <u>SAYING</u> that Jesus came to <u>COMFORT</u> the afflicted and <u>AFFLICT</u> the comfortable. Either way, when you encounter Jesus, he <u>CHANGES</u> you. Jesus comforted the suffering woman and <u>AFFLICTED</u> the <u>COMFORTABLE</u> religious leader. Jesus never <u>LEAVES</u> you the way he <u>FINDS</u> you. He <u>LOVES</u> you <u>JUST</u> the way you are, but <u>TOO MUCH</u> to <u>LEAVE</u> you that way.

That should be your expectation of worship, that Jesus will touch your life in some way, that he'll <u>CHANGE</u> your life. You're not here to go through the motions; you're here to have your eyes opened, so you can <u>SEE</u> God's grace at work. You're not here to just <u>SHOW UP</u>; you're here to be <u>RAISED</u> up, to stand up straight and praise your God.

So when you go out from this place today, you have 2 options -- you can either go shaking your head in contempt, or you can join that crowd at that <u>END</u> of the story, "rejoicing at all the wonderful things" he has done. It's <u>YOUR</u> choice. <u>COMPLAIN</u> or <u>CELEBRATE</u>; the <u>LETTER</u> of the LAW or LOVE.

Either way, Jesus <u>SEES</u> you, as you <u>TRULY</u> are. And <u>JESUS ALWAYS</u> chooses <u>LOVE</u>. Hear the word of our Lord: "Child of God, I <u>SEE</u> you. I see your pain. I know what you're going through. And I love you." Amen.
