Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

May 21, 2023 (7th Sunday in Easter, Year A) Acts 1:6-14, John 17:1-11

Saying GOODBYE is HARD. What do you say?

You're forced to set aside all the small talk, and get down to the <u>BIG</u> stuff. You tell the people you love how you <u>FEEL</u> about them. You tell them how much they <u>MEAN</u> to you. And you tell them the things they need to <u>KNOW</u>, the things you want them to <u>REMEMBER</u>, the <u>IMPORTANT</u> stuff.

In our readings today, we have before us <u>TWO GOODBYES</u>. The first is recorded in the book of Acts, at the Ascension of Our Lord. Now for those who are interested in such things, tradition has it that it was 40 days after Easter when Jesus ascended to heaven. Since Easter is always celebrated on a Sunday, the Ascension is always celebrated on a <u>THURSDAY</u>, so it doesn't get <u>NOTICED</u> that much, but it's become customary to at least <u>ACKOWLEDGE</u> it the following <u>SUNDAY</u>, and so we remember that event TODAY.

The second goodbye we read today was the night before Jesus <u>DIED</u>. For the last few weeks we've been reading from Jesus' <u>FAREWELL</u> discourse in the Gospel of John. In these readings, Jesus knows that he's about to die, so he sits down with his disciples in the upper room, and he tells them the <u>IMPORTANT</u> stuff, the things he wants to make <u>SURE</u> they remember, because this is the <u>LAST CHANCE</u> he'll get.

I want us to take a moment to talk about this. Imagine that you had just a few days left to live. Turn to your neighbor (someone who's not related to you if you can), and share what you would say to your spouse, and your children as you say goodbye. Take 30 seconds and then switch.

I hope you got a sense there just what was at <u>STAKE</u> for Jesus in this Farewell Discourse. It goes on for several chapters, and it ends with <u>THIS</u> reading. It's a <u>PRAYER</u>. He <u>PRAYS</u> for his disciples and for US. Jesus says goodbye by PRAYING for us.

Has anyone ever told you that they were <u>PRAYING</u> for you? I don't mean condescendingly like at the end of an argument, like, "You <u>JUST DON'T GET</u> it, do you? I'll <u>PRAY</u> for you." I mean <u>SINCERELY</u>, "I'm praying for you." Prayer is a powerful thing.

It's said that one of the most <u>INFLUENTIAL</u> things you can do for a <u>TEENAGER</u> is tell them that you're PRAYING for them. It means that you CARE.

It's been <u>PROVEN</u> that hospital patients who <u>KNOW</u> people are praying for them <u>HEAL</u> <u>FASTER</u> than those who don't. That's why we have our prayer page in our printed announcements EVERY week.

And I'm certain that a huge part of the <u>EFFECTIVENESS</u> of every <u>PASTOR'S MINISTRY</u>, including <u>MINE</u>, and the ministry of every <u>CONGREGATION</u>, including <u>THIS</u> one, is dependent on the people's prayers. That's why we devote so much <u>TIME</u> to prayer as a congregation.

It's both humbling and an honor to know that someone is praying for you. It's <u>HUMBLING</u> because we know we <u>NEED</u> prayer. We can't <u>MAKE</u> it by ourselves.

But it's also an HONOR, because we know that someone CARES, and that God HEARS ALL prayers.

Now if God hears all <u>OUR</u> prayers, what about <u>JESUS'</u> prayers? In our Gospel today, we overhear <u>JESUS</u> praying, and he's praying for <u>US</u>. Think about that – <u>JESUS</u> is praying for <u>YOU</u>. Whoa!

Have you ever <u>THOUGHT</u> of yourself like that, as a <u>PERSON JESUS PRAYS</u> for? <u>YOU</u> are the disciples, the ones called, chosen, set apart, and sanctified in the truth. He was praying for <u>YOU</u>. And he <u>STILL IS</u>; Jesus <u>IS PRAYING</u> for <u>YOU</u>.

And that's why we read these two goodbyes <u>TOGETHER</u> – because they point us to the <u>PRESENT</u>. Jesus' prayer is in the <u>PRESENT</u> tense. "Holy Father, protect them in your name that you have given me...May (they) be one as we are one."

The angels asked, "Why do you stand looking up towards heaven?" (Acts 1:11). The Ascension wasn't the <u>END</u> of Jesus' <u>MINISTRY</u>. We can't spend our lives gazing up at Jesus' feet. We need to look <u>AROUND</u> us. The Ascension was the <u>BEGINNING</u> of <u>OUR</u> ministry. Jesus gave us a <u>MISSION</u> – to <u>DO EVERYTHING HE</u> had done and <u>MORE</u>. He said, "You will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem...and <u>TO</u> the <u>ENDS</u> of the earth."

"Why do you stand looking up towards heaven?" When we <u>LOWER</u> our eyes, we can see that our world is a world <u>WITHOUT</u> Christ, <u>WITHOUT</u> love, a world that <u>CREATES DAILY NEW</u> ways to make life <u>MORE CRUEL</u>. There is work to be done.

It's the work Jesus <u>HIMSELF</u> did: proclaiming the good news, loving others selflessly, completely and unconditionally, even loving the <u>UN-</u>lovable.

<u>THESE</u> goodbyes didn't mean that Jesus was leaving the world <u>BEHIND</u>; it means that Jesus was going to be <u>PRESENT</u> in the world in a <u>NEW</u> way, through the Spirit, and through His <u>CHURCH</u>, through <u>US</u>. Jesus' going to be with the Father means that Jesus lives in <u>US</u> now.

He's <u>EMBODIED HERE</u>, in our <u>COMMUNITY</u>. We are <u>NOW</u> the <u>HANDS</u> to do Christ's work, the <u>FEET</u> to walk his way, and the <u>VOICES</u> to speak his words. <u>YOUR</u> hands are the hands of <u>LOVE</u>. That's what we're called to <u>BE</u>, what we're <u>ALL</u> called to be. As Luther put it, we are all called to be "little Christs" for the world. <u>HIS</u> ascension was <u>OUR</u> commissioning.

So people of First Lutheran, and you graduates, as you go out into the world, why do you stand looking up to heaven? Look <u>AROUND</u> you. There's work to be done.

You don't have to look very long or far to find it. This world is <u>SUFFOCATING</u>. It needs a breath of love, it needs CHRIST'S love, and YOU ARE that breath.

Graduates, as we say goodbye, <u>THIS</u> is what we want to say to <u>YOU</u>. We're proud of you. We're <u>PRAYING</u> for you, that God will protect you, that you'll be safe, and <u>MORE</u> than that, that you'll be happy, and find a life that's fulfilling. As parents, you are our <u>HEART</u>, and you <u>TAKE</u> that <u>WITH</u> you. We <u>LOVE</u> you, and <u>WITH</u> the Holy Spirit, we'll <u>ALWAYS</u> be <u>HERE</u> for you. Amen.
