Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

January 21, 2024 (3rd Sunday after Epiphany, Year B) Mark 1:14-20

One of my favorite church signs said this: "Be fishers of people. You catch 'em, He'll clean 'em." It's a classic. It refers to today's gospel, one of the most familiar sayings in the New Testament, <u>DIRECTLY</u> calling us to be an evangelizing church. "Fishing for people" is our <u>MISSION</u>, and we <u>KNOW</u> it. And yet, we don't seem to be sure what "fishing for people" <u>MEANS</u>.

Imagine a fishing <u>CLUB</u> where the members just sat around swapping fish stories about the big one they landed, and the whopper that broke away, but they never stepped into a <u>BOAT</u> or cast their line in the water. What kind of a <u>FISHING</u> club would that be, whose members were content to admire the <u>TROPHIES</u> on the wall, but never actually went <u>FISHING</u>?

A lot of <u>CHURCHES</u> are like that. They sit around bragging about the days when their boat was <u>FULL</u> of fish. They look <u>BACK NOSTALGICALLY</u> on the days when the main purpose of their church was to go fishing, to reach others for Christ. But they never actually <u>GO</u> fishing anymore; they merely <u>TALK ABOUT</u> fishing.

Other churches don't even talk about <u>FISHING</u>; they just talk about their <u>BOAT</u>. They worry about repairing and improving their boat. They wish their boat was bigger. They wish they had more workers. They worry about having the right equipment. But they never actually go out on the water and set the hook. That's not what we're <u>ABOUT</u> as a church.

Our mission is to "<u>BE FISHERS</u> of <u>PEOPLE</u>. You <u>CATCH</u> 'em, <u>HE'LL</u> clean 'em." That's our main <u>PURPOSE</u> as a church, so our main <u>CONCERN</u> should be what kind of <u>BAIT</u> to use. Maybe <u>WORMS</u> won't work when you're fishing for <u>PEOPLE</u>.

Actually, we should take a lesson from the fishermen <u>JESUS</u> called. <u>THEY</u> didn't use <u>BAIT</u> at all. That's not the <u>WAY</u> they fished. They used nets.

A little girl I know was going fishing with her dad. Her mother asked her what she liked about fishing, and she said, "I get to spend time with my dad." A pastor I know said he likes to fish because he can spend time with his friends. That's what fishing with a <u>NET</u> does: it takes <u>SEVERAL</u> people, working <u>TOGETHER</u>, to handle a net. It's a <u>COMMUNITY</u> thing.

As I showed the kids, each person has to do their part. It doesn't matter if there's one or <u>SEVERAL GOOD</u> fishermen in the community, drawing people in; if everyone <u>ISN'T</u> holding their part of the net, the fish get away. We are called to be holy, not a <u>HOLE</u> in the net. Or worse, if there's a "cold fish" in the community, slashing around, saying mean things about people and complaining about what the team is doing, then no matter <u>HOW</u> many "warm" fishermen you have, that <u>ONE</u> person will drive the fish away. Fishing is a <u>COMMUNITY</u> effort.

And community is what sets the church apart. It's <u>WHO</u> we are. The church's entire existence is based on Christ's words, "where two or three are gathered, there I am also." It touches a basic human need in all of us—to belong, to connect.

But the connection isn't just thinking alike or having similar experiences; it's sharing a connection of <u>FAITH</u>. It's belonging to something bigger than us – <u>MORE</u> than that, it's belonging to <u>SOMEONE</u> — bigger than us, yes, but <u>WITH</u> us. That spiritual connection to God, and <u>THROUGH</u> God to each other, is <u>DEEPER</u>, and draws us <u>CLOSER</u>, than we can <u>IMAGINE</u>. It gives life <u>MEANING</u> and <u>HOPE</u>.

We are a community of God's love. And <u>WHO</u> we <u>ARE</u> as a church is also what we <u>DO</u> as a church. We fish for people by <u>SHARING</u> God's love, by giving of ourselves, by welcoming them into the community of believers. <u>THAT</u> is our fishing net. We cast it out together to draw people closer to God.

There's an interesting story about Jerry Rice. He's widely considered to be the greatest wide receiver in NFL history, and often called the greatest NFL player of all time. He played for the San Francisco 49ers for 15 years, 1985 to 2000, and 5 more years after that for other teams. He's a Hall of Famer, and you would <u>THINK</u> he came from some <u>LEGENDARY</u> college team, but he <u>DIDN'T</u>.

He was once asked, "Why did you attend a small, obscure university like Mississippi Valley State in Itta Bena, Mississippi?"

Rice responded, "Out of all the big-time schools (like UCLA) to recruit me, MVSU was the only school to come to my <u>HOUSE</u> and give me a <u>PERSONAL</u> visit."

Those big-time schools recruited through cards, letters, and advertisements, but only <u>ONE</u> coach came to <u>MEET</u> Rice, and showed him <u>PERSONAL ATTENTION</u>. Cards and letters are nice and they're meaningful, but they can only <u>GO SO</u> far. And advertising is <u>IMPERSONAL</u>. It makes a <u>DIFFERENCE</u> in this world to meet people eye to eye, and <u>INVITE</u> them to be a part.

If a <u>HANDSHAKE</u> can do <u>THAT</u>, imagine what <u>GOD</u> can do. As Jesus passed along the Sea of Galilee, he saw Simon and his brother Andrew casting a net into the sea. He approached them and invited them <u>PERSONALLY</u> to be a part of his mission. He went a little further and he saw two more brothers: James and John. He went up to them extending the <u>SAME PERSONAL</u> invitation, and they followed. It's the <u>PERSONAL</u> touch that <u>ATTRACTS</u> us. It makes a <u>DIFFERENCE</u>.

People <u>LONG</u> for a connection, to <u>BELONG</u> to something, and even <u>MORE</u>, to belong to <u>SOMEONE</u>. They <u>WANT</u> to be caught in God's love.

I've talked with many of you about what brought you to First Lutheran when you first moved to the area. Your stories are about someone reaching out to you and inviting you to church or some activity or Bible study here. If it meant that much to you, it means that much to other folks too.

That's what this church has <u>ALWAYS</u> been about. We are a <u>COMMUNITY</u> of <u>GOD'S LOVE</u>. And our calling is to <u>CAST</u> that <u>NET</u> of God's love, and draw people <u>IN</u>. "<u>BE FISHERS</u> of <u>PEOPLE</u>. You <u>CATCH</u> 'em, <u>HE'LL</u> clean 'em." Amen.
