March 10, 2024 (4th Sunday in Lent, Year B) Ephesians 2:1-10 John 3:14-21

I want to share something with you about myself. It's a little personal, but I'll bet many of you can relate to this. I'm 52 years old now, and I'm still waiting for my father to tell me that he loves me for the first time. When I was growing up, he <u>NEVER, EVER</u> said, "I love you" or "I'm proud of you." Not once. It just isn't his way. I know, deep down, he <u>DOES</u> love me and he's proud of me, but just <u>ONCE</u>, I'd like to <u>HEAR</u> those words. I know many of <u>YOU</u> know <u>EXACTLY</u> what I mean.

Sometimes we <u>ACT</u> like we <u>DON'T</u> need to hear the words, but we <u>DO</u>. There's a story about an old married couple. They'd been married for over 50 years! And one day the wife gets fed up. She goes to her husband and says, "I've had it. I can't take it any more. In all these years, you've never <u>ONCE</u> said that you loved me." And the man says, "Well, <u>SURE</u> I have." But she holds her ground and says, "No, you never have, not once." And he says, "Well, I <u>TOLD</u> you I loved you when we got <u>MARRIED</u>, and if anything <u>CHANGES</u>, I'll <u>LET</u> ya <u>KNOW</u>."

We may <u>ACT</u> like we don't need to hear "I love you," <u>BUT WE DO</u>. We need to hear it as <u>OFTEN</u> as <u>POSSIBLE</u>.

Jesus says that people <u>HIDE</u> from the light, because they <u>PREFER</u> the <u>DARKNESS</u>. I think that <u>A LOT</u> of people prefer the darkness, because they've <u>JUST</u> <u>GOTTEN USED</u> to darkness. Sometimes the darkness is so <u>DEEP</u>, that <u>HIDING</u> from the <u>LIGHT</u> is all they can do to <u>PROTECT</u> themselves. Let me give you an example of what I mean.

You may remember <u>YEARS AGO</u> the movie "Good Will Hunting." There's a scene in the movie where Robin Williams' character, Shawn, is counseling Matt Damon's character, Will. They're talking about how they had <u>EACH</u> been <u>ABUSED</u> as children. Will shares how his foster dad would come home <u>DRUNK</u> and lay objects on the table, like a belt and a wrench, and make Will <u>CHOOSE</u> what he'd be <u>BEATEN</u> with that night. And Shawn says, "Will, you <u>KNOW</u> that none of this was your <u>FAULT</u>, right." And Will says, "Yeah, I know that." And Shawn walks closer and gently says, "It's not your fault." And Will <u>STIFFENS</u> up and tries to say matter-of-factly "I know." But Shawn says, "No, you <u>DON'T</u>, Will. It's not your fault." And Will starts to get angry, and <u>YELLS</u> and pushes him, but Shawn keeps saying "It's not your fault. It's not your fault." And eventually, Will breaks down and he <u>CRIES</u>, he cries like he <u>NEVER</u> had before, like a <u>LITTLE BOY</u> who had been <u>BEATEN</u>, like the boy he had <u>NEVER</u> been <u>ALLOWED</u> to <u>BE</u>. He knew in his <u>HEAD</u> that it wasn't his fault, but he had never <u>BELIEVED</u> it in his <u>HEART</u>.

There are some things we need to <u>HEAR OVER</u> and <u>OVER</u> again, before we can start to <u>BELIEVE</u> them: It's not your fault; I believe in you; I trust you; I forgive you. And like our children and our husbands our wives, we need to hear the words, "I <u>LOVE</u> you" <u>ALL</u> the <u>TIME</u>.

We need to hear that <u>GOD</u> loves us too. That's why God gave us his Son, so he could <u>SHOW</u> us his love. That's why God gave us his Spirit, so he can be <u>WITH</u> us all the time. That's why God gave us his Word and the Sacraments, so we can <u>KNOW</u>, <u>AND FEEL</u>, <u>AND TOUCH</u> his love. And that's why we have <u>WORSHIP</u> every week, to hear that we are loved.

Now some <u>MAY</u> think, "Hey, I'm a pretty <u>GOOD</u> person. I learned what I <u>NEEDED</u> in Sunday school. I go to church. God knows I believe. If anything <u>CHANGES</u>, I'll let him know." But it's hard to have a <u>RELATIONSHIP</u> with <u>ANYONE</u>, <u>INCLUDING GOD</u>, if we hardly <u>TALK</u>, <u>OR LISTEN</u>, to them. The truth is that we need to <u>HEAR</u> God say "I love you" as <u>OFTEN</u> as possible.

And that's <u>WHY</u> John 3:16 is the most well-known verse in the whole Bible. Say it with me – you know it: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but have eternal life." You <u>KNOW</u> that verse, because it's <u>GOD SPEAKING</u> <u>RIGHT</u> to your heart; it's God <u>SAYING</u>, "I love you."

A story, a <u>TRUE</u> story:

In Mount Sterling, Misssouri lives a man named Emil Leimkuehler. One day he went down to the coffee shop and got to talking with old Gus Richter. Gus told a story that he used to have an old tractor, a 1917 International Harvester Titan, but he sold it to the Barite open pit mine. It did its duty of pumping rain and seep water out of the mine for a number of years, until the great depression made the mine unprofitable, and it shut down. Over the years, the pit had gradually filled with water. But the mine company had no more <u>USE</u> for that old tractor, so they had just <u>LEFT</u> it down there, and some 40 years later, it was <u>STILL</u> down there under 65 feet of water.

Now this got Emil thinking. He wanted that old tractor. But first he had to find it. Now, if you haven't figured it out by his name, Emil Leimkueler was German, and (I'm half German so I'm allowed to say this) Germans are notoriously cheap. Instead of hiring divers to find the tractor, Emil went fishing for it. He sank a large hook down to the bottom of the pit and trolled back and forth with his boat for days. Of course, he <u>DIDN'T</u> find it, so he had to break down and hire the divers anyway. Two divers were unsuccessful, and one of them said, "I think you must have bought an empty hole." But Germans are also notoriously stubborn, and Emil wasn't about to give up, so he hired a <u>3rd</u> diver, and <u>HE FOUND</u> it.

Emil made arrangements for a crane to lift out the old tractor, but when the cables were attached to the lifting boom, even with the boom fully extended, the crane needed to sit right up to the <u>EDGE</u> of the pit, to avoid <u>DRAGGING</u> the antique tractor along the rocky bottom.

Both the crane operator and the scuba diver asked, "Do you think you will be able to salvage enough iron and parts to <u>PAY</u> for this operation?" But Emil told them they'd understand <u>LATER</u>.

Now all the while, back at the coffee shop, they were making fun of Emil. He was wasting time, and, worse, he was wasting <u>MONEY</u>. The tractor was worthless. Even if he got it <u>OUT</u>, it would be <u>RUSTY AND USELESS</u>.

But Emil <u>DID</u> rescue it. After 40 years in a watery grave, the old tractor finally broke the surface and came to light. It was in rough shape, but he started to work on it right away.

It took him 3 years to restore the old tractor, but when he was finished, it looked brand new. Like this.

(Show picture of the Titan tractor 3.)

Emil took it around the country to show it off and tell its story. Now, people understand. It wasn't <u>FOR MONEY</u>; it was a labor of <u>LOVE</u>.

Can you <u>IMAGINE</u> a <u>LOVE</u> and a <u>DETERMINATION SO STRONG</u> that it was willing to go down into a <u>PIT to SAVE a WORTHLESS PIECE of JUNK</u>? (Advance slide.)

God can. <u>GOD HAS</u>. <u>TWICE</u> in our reading from Ephesians, it says that we were <u>DEAD</u> through our sins and trespasses. We were worthless. But God <u>SO LOVED</u> us, and <u>SO WANTED</u> us <u>ANYWAY</u>, that Jesus was willing to <u>DIE</u>, and go down into the pit of <u>HELL</u> to <u>SAVE</u> us.

I was once in an arcade, where they had an area with a big sign that said, "Redemption Center." The idea is that you bring over your tickets from the games, and they trade them for toys. The <u>TRUTH</u> is, you're trading pieces of <u>PAPER</u> for <u>WORTHLESS</u> <u>JUNK</u>. That's what <u>WE</u> call <u>REDEMPTION</u> in this world.

Here's <u>REAL</u> redemption. We come to <u>GOD</u> with <u>NOTHING</u>. <u>NO</u>, <u>GOD</u> comes to <u>US</u>, and <u>OFFERS</u> to <u>TAKE</u> our <u>BROKEN LIVES</u> and <u>WORTHLESS</u> <u>SINS</u> and, in <u>EXCHANGE</u>, <u>GIVE</u> us ... <u>EVERYTHING – SALVATION, HOPE, JOY, PEACE, ETERNAL LIFE</u>!

<u>HEAR</u> his words again: "For God <u>SO LOVED</u> the world that he <u>GAVE</u> his only Son, so that <u>EVERYONE</u> who <u>BELIEVES</u> in him may <u>NOT PERISH</u> but <u>HAVE ETERNAL LIFE</u>."

What an <u>AMAZING GIFT</u> this is, <u>COMPLETELY UNDESERVED</u>. You are redeemed. You are <u>FORGIVEN</u>. YOU ARE LOVED. Amen.
