Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

September 10, 2023 (Proper 18, Year A) Matthew 18:15-20

Today we are praying for all the victims of the recent fires, hurricanes and earthquakes. I want to start today by showing you a piece from the evening news a few years back about Hurricane Harvey.

Are you wondering why I would show you a story about football today? Because, it's not really <u>ABOUT</u> football, is it? It's about community. Those kids <u>NEEDED</u> community. They were <u>STARVING</u> for it

And so are we. Especially now, with so much bad news of death and destruction, we <u>CRAVE</u> community.

They said they aren't just a team; they're a family. Jesus used that <u>SAME</u> kind of language in our Gospel today. Where our translation says, "If another member of the church sins against you," it <u>LITERALLY</u> says, "If a <u>BROTHER OR SISTER</u> sins against you." Jesus <u>OFTEN</u> used family language to talk about members of the church. That's why we <u>USE</u> those terms in church: you're my brother, you're my sister. That's how <u>CLOSE</u> we are <u>MEANT</u> to <u>BE</u> in the church – like a family.

And <u>LIKE</u> a family, we <u>HAVE</u> our disagreements. But we don't let those <u>DESTROY</u> the family. Because we LOVE each other, we don't just walk away; we find a way to work it out.

Jesus was a realist. He knew it would <u>HAPPEN</u>. He <u>KNEW</u> his church <u>WOULDN'T</u> be perfect. Like I said last week, the church is made up of <u>PEOPLE</u>, and people are <u>SINNERS</u>, and that means occasionally we <u>WILL</u> sin against each <u>OTHER</u>. Those "two or three gathered" may include people who don't get <u>ALONG</u> with each other. It may even include people who <u>CAN'T STAND</u> each other.

That's why Jesus gave us this procedure for dealing with conflict. Jesus says that we need to hold each other accountable. It's not okay to do things that hurt others, and Christians aren't just DOORMATS for people to WALK all over. He had just talked about stumbling blocks and tearing out the eye that causes you to sin.

But this is hard. It means confronting a person, and most of would do just about <u>ANYTHING</u> to <u>AVOID CONFLICT</u>. We don't <u>LIKE</u> conflict. Which is why we <u>DO</u> all the <u>CRAZY</u> things we do <u>INSTEAD</u> of <u>TALKING TO</u> the person.

But there's something we need to remember – Jesus never <u>MEANT</u> this as a way to get <u>RID</u> of people; it's intended as a way to restore the member, to <u>MEND</u> the relationship.

It's like a doctor telling a long-time patient that the tests for cancer came back positive. It honestly <u>PAINS</u> the doctor to tell a <u>FRIEND</u> the bad news. So what if the doctor does as <u>WE</u> so often do? What if they doctor just <u>DOESN'T</u> say anything? Or says everything is <u>FINE</u>? Then the patient can <u>NEVER</u> get better.

In the same way, it causes <u>US</u> pain to confront a friend with their sin, so we often <u>DON'T</u>. And the <u>RELATIONSHIP</u> <u>DIES</u>. It's like Jesus said last week: "Those who seek to <u>SAVE</u> their own life will <u>LOSE</u> it." Only when the painful diagnosis is <u>MADE</u> can the healing begin.

The church is a family just like <u>YOURS</u>. How does it feel to <u>LOSE</u> a member of <u>YOUR</u> family? What if someone is shunned or disowned? What if someone leaves and never talks to the family again? Losing a member of the family in <u>ANY</u> way is painful for the <u>WHOLE</u> family. What would you do to get that one BACK? To bring them home?

In the last 2 days we had to very difficult funerals here at First Lutheran. One was a beloved long-time member. The other was a young man, only 40 years old, who left behind 2 young

daughters. He was the second and only remaining son his parents buried. The lost both of their children. Can you imagine?

What do you think these families would do to get their loved ones back? To have even <u>ONE</u> more day with them? They would do anything!

For Jesus, that what's at stake here. We should be willing to do anything to bring our church family member back. In comparison, what a <u>SMALL</u> thing it is to just <u>SAY</u> something that makes you UNCOMFORTABLE.

For Jesus, <u>LOSING</u> even <u>ONE</u> sister or brother in the faith is <u>UNACCEPTABLE</u>. Even <u>ONE</u> <u>LOST</u> is <u>UNACCEPTABLE</u>. It's no accident that the verses right before this in Matthew are about the shepherd leaving the 99 and searching for the <u>ONE</u> lost sheep. Both passages are about bringing the LOST one back home.

So you see, this doesn't come from a smug, "I'm better than you," attitude, because we are <u>ALL SINNERS</u>; it comes from a <u>SINCERE CONCERN</u> for the <u>PERSON</u>. We are to be so <u>CONCERNED</u> about the break in the relationship, that we're willing to do <u>WHATEVER</u> we can to <u>RESTORE</u> it, whatever it <u>TAKES</u>.

Jesus is very clear about how Christians are <u>SUPPOSED</u> to handle conflict, <u>EVEN</u> and <u>ESPECIALLY</u>, in our <u>PERSONAL</u> lives. We will <u>NOT</u> walk away – from the congregation, the group, or the <u>PERSON</u>, because our <u>FEELINGS</u> are hurt. We will <u>NOT</u> hold a grudge. We will <u>NOT</u> engage in scorekeeping and paybacks. We will <u>NOT</u> <u>YELL</u> at someone in front of other people. We will not embarrass, humiliate, or try to destroy another person, EVEN if they have hurt US.

We <u>WILL</u> try to <u>RESTORE</u> the relationship, by talking to them in private. If that doesn't work, we will talk to them again with a couple witnesses. Even if they <u>NEVER</u> listen, even to the church, and we have to "let such a one be to you as a Gentile and a tax collector," that is <u>NOT</u> the <u>LAST</u> word; <u>LOVE</u> is. <u>LOVE</u> is <u>ALWAYS</u> the <u>LAST</u> word. The <u>HOPE</u> is that the person will see the error of their ways, and come <u>BACK</u> to the fold.

And by the way, how did <u>JESUS</u> treat Gentiles and tax collectors? This is the Gospel of Matthew. What was Matthew? A tax collector. Jesus ate dinner with Gentiles and tax collectors, reached out to them, ministered to them, and called them to come and be disciples.

EVERYTHING in the church, and in the life of an INDIVIDUAL CHRISTIAN, EVEN how we handle CONFLICT, is about BUILDING UP THE BODY OF CHRIST, building people UP, NEVER about TEARING SOMEONE DOWN. Jesus died and rose again to reconcile us to God, and we are CHILDREN of God, so RECONCILIATION IS THE FAMILY BUSINESS. LOVE is what we DO. When we gather in Jesus name, he is with us.

It's our <u>MISSION</u> as the church, and as <u>CHRISTIANS</u>, to <u>BRING</u> his presence to those in need. Our disagreements should <u>NEVER</u> get in the way of that mission. They should be handled with the <u>SAME LOVE AND MERCY</u> we hope to <u>RECEIVE</u>.

Which brings us back to where we began. Did this subject seem out of <u>PLACE</u> today, when we <u>STARTED</u> by talking about hurricanes and earthquake victims? Did talking about <u>ARGUMENTS</u> in the church seem petty and inappropriate, when we <u>SHOULD</u> be talking about mission?

It <u>ALWAYS</u> does, my friends. It <u>ALWAYS</u> <u>DOES</u>. Amen.
