## Sermons at Hope Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

## June 17, 2018 (Proper 6, Year B) Mark 4:26-34

Today is Fathers' Day, a day to honor our fathers. And that's good, because dads don't get much respect these days.

A mother was out walking with her 4 year old daughter. The child picked up something off the ground and started to put it into her mouth. The mother took it away and said "Don't do that!"

"Why not?" asked the child.

"Because it's on the ground," said her mother. "You don't know where it's been. It's dirty, and it's probably loaded with germs that could make you sick."

The child looked at her mother with total admiration and said, "Mommy, you're so smart. How do you know all this stuff?"

The mother said, "All Moms know this stuff. It's on the Mom Test. You have to know it or they don't <u>LET</u> you be a Mom."

There was silence for a moment as the child thought this through. "Oh, I get it," she said at last. "And if you don't pass the test, you have to be the Daddy?"

Ah, Father's Day. It's not EASY being a Dad.

In our lesson from Mark, Jesus says, "This is what the kingdom of God is like. A man scatters seed on the ground. Night and day, whether he sleeps or gets up, the seed sprouts and grows, though he does not know how..." Now, Jesus obviously isn't <u>INTENTIONALLY</u> talking directly about fatherhood in this passage, but raising our children is one the <u>GREATEST</u> areas in which we <u>PARTICIPATE</u> in God's kingdom, and Jesus <u>IS</u> talking about that. Raising good children is like planting seed in the ground.

There are <u>NO GUARANTEES</u>, in raising kids <u>OR</u> planting seeds. A farmer can do all the right things and <u>STILL LOSE</u> a crop. And so can <u>PARENTS</u>. The farmer can till the ground at the right time, put in the right seed, and irrigate and fertilize by textbook. But that <u>STILL</u> doesn't <u>GUARANTEE</u> a crop.

Some of us have learned the <u>HARD</u> way that there <u>ARE</u> no guarantees, in plants...<u>OR</u> in people. In the end, God calls us to plant the seed and nurture it, but whether and <u>HOW</u> it grows isn't <u>UP</u> to us.

One day, a young boy named Thomas Edison was sent home from school with a note, and told that only his mother was allowed to read it.

Thomas Edison was mentally slow and unable to think clearly.

I know that a story about his mother, but I'm highlighting little <u>THOMAS</u> Edison here. People grow and mature at different rates. Winston Churchill was admitted to school in the lowest aptitude classes, and he never moved <u>OUT</u> of the lowest group in <u>ALL</u> the years he attended. Albert Einstein seemed so slow and dull that his parents feared that he was mentally retarded, as they called it back then. As one person put it, "Great minds and high talent, in most cases, cannot be hurried and, like healthy plants, grow slowly."

That's how it is with Kingdom of <u>GOD</u> too. We scatter the seed, but we're not ultimately <u>RESPONSIBLE</u> for its growth. We can't <u>MAKE</u> things happen. The process by which the kingdom of this <u>WORLD BECOMES</u> the Kingdom of God is a slow one, sometimes <u>VERY</u> slow, and it <u>FRUSTRATES</u> us. But, at the same time, if we have faithfully scattered the seed, we're not to <u>BLAME</u> for its <u>FAILURE</u> to mature <u>IMMEDIATELY</u>. It's not <u>UP</u> to us. Jesus cautions us here to be <u>PATIENT</u>.

It may take a <u>LONG</u> time to see the fruit of our labor. Parents know this. We see it in our children. Mark Twain wrote, "When I was a boy of fourteen, my father was so ignorant I could hardly stand to have the old man around. But when I got to be twenty-one, I was astonished at how much the old man had <u>LEARNED</u> in <u>SEVEN</u> years." It took <u>21 YEARS</u> for <u>MARK TWAIN'S FATHER</u> to see the fruit of <u>HIS</u> labor.

Have you heard of the Chinese Bamboo Tree? To grow, the Chinese Bamboo Tree requires a lot of nurturing – watering, fertile soil, and sunshine.

If you plant the seed, water the tree, and add fertilizer for a whole <u>YEAR</u>, <u>NOTHING</u> happens. There are <u>NO</u> visible signs of growth in spite of providing <u>ALL</u> of these things.

After a second year of watering and fertilizing, <u>AGAIN</u> there's <u>NO GROWTH</u> to be seen.

Three and four years on, there is <u>STILL</u> <u>NO</u> sign of anything happening. <u>NOTHING</u> to show for all your effort!

Your patience is tested, and you begin to wonder if your efforts caring for and watering the tree are worth it. People come by and say, "Hey, what's up with this plant you keep putting so much work into. I'm just not seeing it."

But then <u>FINALLY</u>, in the <u>FIFTH</u> year, something <u>AMAZING</u> happens – the Chinese Bamboo Tree grows 80 feet tall in just six weeks! They say that if it's quiet enough, you can actually <u>HEAR</u> it growing.

But think for a moment, does the Chinese Bamboo Tree truly do <u>NOTHING</u> for four years. only to grow <u>EXPONENTIALLY</u> in the fifth?

In fact, for the <u>FIRST 4</u> years, the tree was growing underground, developing a root system strong enough to support its <u>POTENTIAL</u> for growth in the <u>FIFTH</u> year. 80 feet in six weeks! Had the tree <u>NOT</u> developed a strong <u>UNSEEN</u> foundation, it couldn't have sustained its <u>FUTURE</u> heights.

And had the Chinese Bamboo Tree <u>FARMER STOPPED</u> caring for it and watering it and fertilizing it, it <u>NEVER</u> would have burst through the surface.

When it comes to people's <u>HEARTS</u>, a good crop may take <u>YEARS</u> to come in, <u>SO LONG</u> that the sewers may <u>NEVER</u> get to see it themselves, but Jesus says, "Have faith — the harvest is in <u>GOD'S</u> hands." It takes <u>faith</u> to <u>KEEP WORKING</u> while you wait.

All we can do is rely on the promise that farmers and gardeners, and teachers and <u>PARENTS</u> already know—that what happens with the seed depends on <u>GOD</u>, and <u>NOT</u> on us. We can tend to it and do all we can to <u>HELP</u> the seed grow, but, in the end, <u>WE</u> don't <u>MAKE</u> that seed sprout; <u>GOD</u> does.

When it comes down to it, we're not called to be successful; we are called to be faithful. It's simply our task to sow the seed, and to have <u>FAITH</u>, and leave the <u>REST</u> to God.

This is what the Kingdom of God is like. This is what farming and gardening is like. And this is what <u>PARENTHOOD</u> is like. Because this is what <u>LIFE</u> is like. Do what you can; trust <u>GOD</u> to do the rest. Amen.
