## Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

## February 9, 2025 (5<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Epiphany, Year C) Luke 5:1-11

A fishing story.

A man was stopped by a game-warden in a State Park with his live well full of fish. The game warden asked, "Do you have a license to catch those fish?"

The man replied, "No, sir. These are my PET fish."

"Pet fish?" the game warden wondered.

"Yes, sir. Every night I take these here fish down to the lake and let them swim around for a while. I whistle and they jump right back into the boat, and I take 'em home."

"That's a bunch of nonsense! Fish can't do that!"

The man looked at the game warden for a moment, and said, "Here, I'll show you. It really works."

The game warden was curious. "OK. I've GOT to see this!"

The man put all the fish into the water and stood and waited. After several minutes, the game warden turned to the man and said, "Well?"

"Well, what?" the man responded.

"When are you going to call them back?"

"Call who back?" the man said.

"The FISH!"

"What fish?" said the man innocently.

We have in our Gospel today a fish tale, but this one reads more like a parable. Simon hadn't caught any fish either, but the way the story PLAYS OUT is meant to TEACH us something.

Our first <u>CLUE</u> of that is that this story in recorded in the Gospel at <u>ALL</u>. This has always struck me. When Matthew and Mark tell this story, <u>THEY DON'T INCLUDE</u> the miracle. In fact, Luke is the <u>ONLY</u> Gospel that has this miracle. When Matthew and Mark tell the story, it's a <u>LOT SHORTER</u>. Jesus is just walking along the beach, and sees these fishermen, and calls, "Follow Me," and they drop everything and <u>FOLLOW</u> him.

That's it — short and sweet. The MIRACLE ISN'T THERE.

Did Matthew and Mark forget it? Probably not. It's more like, for <u>THEM</u>, the miracle wasn't <u>IMPORTANT</u>; something <u>ELSE</u> was: it was Jesus' <u>CALLING</u>. That's the <u>ONE</u> thing <u>ALL THREE</u> gospel writers agreed on: Jesus said, "From now on you'll be fishing for people." His Word is so <u>POWERFUL</u> that they're <u>TRANSFORMED</u>. <u>JESUS SPEAKS AND SUDDENLY</u>, fishermen become disciples. Even <u>THIS</u> version of the story has a nod to that, when Simon protests, but relents: "At your <u>WORD</u>, I will let down the nets."

The <u>DIFFERENCE</u> between this version and Matthew and Mark's is that when <u>LUKE TELLS</u> this story, he doesn't tell it from <u>JESUS'</u> perspective; he tells it from <u>SIMON'S</u> point of view.

And Simon <u>KNEW</u> there was a lot <u>MORE</u> to this story. This encounter on the beach was <u>NOT</u> the <u>FIRST</u> time he had <u>MET</u> Jesus. A few days before, Simon had <u>HEARD</u> about Jesus and asked him to come to his <u>HOME</u> and <u>HEAL</u> his mother-in-law. Jesus <u>DID</u> that, and <u>MUCH MORE</u>, spending the <u>REST</u> of the day healing people from the town at <u>SIMON'S HOUSE</u>. Simon had <u>SEEN</u> things. He'd HEARD things.

So, when Simon saw Jesus with <u>SUCH</u> a crowd pressing in on him that they were <u>PUSHING</u> him into the lake, Simon wasn't surprised. But <u>EVERYTHING</u> that happened <u>NEXT, WAS</u> a surprise. Jesus got <u>INTO HIS BOAT</u> and asked him to put out a little way from the shore.

This is where the story <u>BECOMES A LIVING PARABLE</u>. The <u>CROWD</u> is <u>STILL</u> the crowd <u>TODAY</u>. They're just sampling Jesus. Checking him out to see what he's all about. They'll listen as long as it's EASY. THEY'LL stay on the LAND, thank you very much.

The FISHERMEN ACT. They go out onto the lake.

The beach was <u>SAFE</u>, but the <u>WATER</u>, <u>EVEN</u> just a little way from shore, was a little <u>MORE</u> RISKY.

One of the few creatures on earth that can out-jump a basketball player or a high jumper is the Impala. This is an African deer with a supercharged spring. It has a vertical leap of over 10 feet and can broad-jump over 30 feet. You would think that the zoos of the world would find it <a href="IMPOSSIBLE">IMPOSSIBLE</a> to keep such an animal enclosed. Not so! It's rather <a href="EASY">EASY</a>. Because the experts have discovered something <a href="ABOUT">ABOUT</a> the Impala. It will <a href="MOT JUMP">MOT JUMP</a> unless it can <a href="SEE WHERE">SEE WHERE</a> it's going to land. Therefore, a solid wall of even <a href="E6">6</a> feet tall is sufficient for an enclosure.

Lots of <u>CHRISTIANS</u> have the <u>IMPALA PROBLEM</u>. They won't take a leap of <u>FAITH</u> unless they have all the answers in <u>ADVANCE</u> about where the leap will <u>TAKE</u> them. But God is looking for some <u>BOLD</u> believers who, even in the face of the unknown, will leap when the Spirit says leap, and fly when the Spirit says fly.

In our Bible book study this week, we talked a little about a weekend experience called Via de Cristo or Christille, that many of them had attended years ago. It was a life-changing experience for everyone I have ever talked to that went to it, but it <u>IS NO MORE</u>. Our group of attendees thinks it's because people were not told what would <u>HAPPEN</u> at the event, just to <u>TRUST THE PROCESS</u> and follow the <u>SPIRIT</u>. The event doesn't happen anymore because people stopped going. They couldn't handle <u>NOT KNOWING</u> the schedule.

So, why did the fishermen <u>GO</u>? They were tired. They'd been <u>OUT ALL NIGHT WORKING</u>, and they were <u>DONE</u> for the day, cleaning their nets. They were just about <u>HOME</u>. Why go back out on the water at ALL?

They got back into their boat, because <u>JESUS ASKED</u> them too. And they knew <u>ENOUGH</u> ABOUT Jesus to know that he was WORTH THE RISK.

The <u>CROWDS</u> could only go as far as their earlier amazement, or the opposition of the Pharisees and teachers, but the <u>FISHERMEN RESPONDED</u> to Jesus and <u>OBEYED</u>.

If you haven't figured it out already, the fishermen are us, the members of the <u>CHURCH</u>, the ones who do the <u>WORK</u>. Jesus calls us to act, and we <u>RESPOND</u>.

But Jesus isn't <u>DONE</u> with us. He calls us to "put out into the <u>DEEP</u> water." To go deeper. The DEEP water is dangerous and unknown. It's risky. We don't know what will happen to us out there.

And Simon knew <u>BETTER</u>. He was a professional fisherman and he'd tried and <u>FAILED</u> to find any fish <u>ALL NIGHT</u>. He was a defeated man. The fishermen <u>COULD</u> have said, "We tried that <u>BEFORE</u> and it didn't work. It's <u>NOT WORTH</u> it." They could have said that, and <u>NO ONE</u> would have disagreed with them.

George Frederick Handel was dogged with misfortune. He had debt upon debt, despair upon despair. He had a cerebral hemorrhage and was paralyzed on his right side. For four years he could neither walk nor write. The doctors gave up on him. He wrote several operas, but again he fell in debt. At age 60 he thought his life was finished.

Then he was challenged by a friend to write a sacred oratorio. He read the Scriptures and decided to work on one. For 24 days, he worked fanatically to produce his piece, which many today consider the greatest oratorio ever written – the Messiah.

The prospects of something <u>GREAT</u> happening can look grim. Simon had fished all night and caught nothing. Jesus asked him to let down his nets for a catch. It <u>SEEMED FOOLISH</u>, because Simon knew <u>BETTER</u>, that there <u>WERE NO</u> fish to <u>CATCH</u>. "But at your word," he said, "I will let down the nets."

This is what it means to be a <u>COMMITTED</u> Christian. Maturing Christians are willing to seek <u>DEEPER ANSWERS</u> to the questions, to risk trying again, or to try something new, to <u>GO</u> where he <u>CALLS</u> us to go.

But Jesus <u>STILL</u> isn't done with us. He calls us to be his <u>DISCIPLES</u>. Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people."

A young pastor from Zimbabwe once wrote: "I'm a part of the fellowship of the unashamed. I have the Holy Spirit power. The die has been cast. I have stepped over the line. I'm a disciple of his. I won't look back, let up, slow down, back away, or be still. My past is redeemed, my present makes sense, my future is secure. I'm finished and done with low living, sight walking, smooth knees, colorless dreams, tamed visions, worldly talking, cheap giving and dwarfed goals. I no longer need preeminence, prosperity, position, promotions, plaudits or popularity. I don't <a href="HAVE">HAVE</a> to be first, tops, recognized, praised, regarded or rewarded. I now live by <a href="FAITH">FAITH</a>, lean into his presence, walk in patience, am uplifted by prayer, and I <a href="LABOR WITH POWER">LABOR WITH POWER</a>."

Woo! You see, when you've experienced Jesus' power on the lake, you come back a changed person. When you've gone into the <u>DEEP</u> water with <u>JESUS</u>, when you respond to his Word, you don't come back to the shore the same. You come back a DISCIPLE.

Jesus is calling in <u>YOUR</u> lives too, calling you to go <u>DEEPER</u>. When you were baptized, Christ was calling you. When you were called to <u>FAITH</u> in God, Christ was calling you. When you <u>LIVE OUT</u> your baptisms in the world, when you <u>SERVE OTHERS</u>, Christ <u>IS</u> calling you. And here today, in <u>THIS CHURCH</u>, Christ is <u>CALLING</u> you: "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching people. Follow <u>ME</u>." Amen.
