Sermons at First Lutheran Church (ELCA) Reggie Denton, Pastor

June 18, 2023 (Lect 11, Proper 6, Year A Matthew 9:35-10:23

Jesus <u>COMMANDED</u> us to pray to "the Lord <u>OF</u> the harvest to send out laborers <u>INTO</u> his harvest."

But the harvest may not be <u>WHERE</u> we <u>THINK</u> it is. The story is told of a farmer in ancient Persia named Ali Hafed. He had a large farm with gardens and grain fields, and was a wealthy man. But one day he had a visitor who told him all about diamonds, a wonderful stone that was found in far-away lands They were the most precious commodity on earth, and a person who had them would be wealthy beyond belief.

Ali Hafed went to bed that night, but he couldn't sleep. The words of the visitor haunted him. He felt that he had to <u>HAVE</u> one of these diamonds. Soon, he <u>SOLD</u> his farm, and went out to <u>FIND</u> his diamonds.

Years passed. He was broken in body and spirit. His funds were gone. After <u>MANY</u> years, he died <u>POOR</u> and <u>PENNILESS</u>, having <u>NEVER</u> found what he sought.

Meanwhile, the man who <u>BOUGHT</u> his farm led his camel to the water to drink, and saw something glimmering in the water. This was only the <u>FIRST</u> of <u>MANY</u> shining stones in the river.

This, according the legend, is how the famous diamond mine of Golconda was discovered, the most <u>MAGNIFICENT</u> diamond mine in the world, from which such jewels as the Hope Diamond and the Crown Jewels of England were taken.

Had Ali Hafed stayed home and looked <u>AROUND</u> him, he would have had <u>ACRES</u> of diamonds. He just never <u>LOOKED</u> in his <u>OWN</u> back yard.

Foreign missions will always be important to the church, but in <u>TODAY'S</u> world, in the <u>UNITED</u> <u>STATES</u>, the mission field has <u>CHANGED</u>. We can't neglect our <u>OWN</u> back yard. Today, Africa is actually sending missionaries <u>HERE</u>. The <u>HARVEST</u> is <u>HERE</u>.

My friends, I know that the Aitkin isn't growing like the Cities and suburbs, but I also know that there are <u>ACRES</u> of diamonds right here in our own back yard. There are people right here in <u>OUR</u> area that <u>DON'T HAVE</u> church families, just <u>WAITING</u> to be asked. All we have to do is pick up the diamonds that are <u>AROUND</u> us.

We have evidence of this. I've told you often about our Wednesday Coffeehouse and Wednesday Night Faith Class for the 5th and 6th graders. That class kept growing the entire year, because the kids kept asking their friends to come along.

I know of another Lutheran church that experienced the same thing. One year, of the 140 kids registered in their k-6th grade Wednesday night program, <u>64</u> of them were not members there. They didn't belong to <u>ANY</u> church, and <u>NEVER HAD</u>.

Those families are called the <u>UNCHURCHED</u>, and <u>THAT</u> is our mission field. And those kids that <u>INVITED</u> their friends are <u>MISSIONARIES</u>.

Jesus says that the harvest is plentiful. But the harvest will <u>NEVER</u> be brought in unless there are workers to reap it. Jesus needs <u>PEOPLE</u> to be his hands and feet, to carry his Word. He <u>STILL</u> wants people to hear his message, to hear the good news, but they'll <u>NEVER</u> hear it unless <u>OTHER</u> people tell them.

This is what we call "evangelism." Evangelism is what the church has <u>ALWAYS</u> been about. It's our <u>PURPOSE</u> for <u>EXISTING</u>. "Go, therefore, and make disciples." Evangelism isn't <u>ON</u> the <u>AGENDA</u> of the church; it <u>IS</u> the agenda of the church. <u>IT'S WHAT WE DO</u>.

<u>JESUS NEEDS PEOPLE</u>. Now, on <u>ONE</u> hand, there's a tremendous shortage of pastors right now. And it's only getting <u>WORSE</u>, because the number of pastors retiring each year far <u>EXCEEDS</u> the number coming <u>OUT</u> of seminary. We need to encourage our youth to <u>CONSIDER MINISTRY</u> as a calling. First Lutheran has already sent a few of our young people into ministry, but there is <u>MORE</u> work to be done.

<u>BUT</u>, evangelism isn't <u>JUST</u> for <u>PASTORS</u>. It's the prayer of Christ that <u>EVERY</u> Christian should be a missionary and an evangelist. If the harvest of people is <u>EVER</u> going to be brought in, then <u>EVERY</u> one of us has to be a worker. We are <u>ALL</u> part of the priesthood of all believers, and <u>EVERY</u> ONE of us is called to <u>SHARE</u> our faith.

Now that said, not <u>ONLY</u> has the <u>HARVEST</u> changed, so has the way we <u>DO</u> evangelism. This is why so many of us <u>FEAR SHARING</u> our faith – we <u>STILL</u> think of it in terms of knocking on doors and talking to people we don't even <u>KNOW</u>. But notice what <u>JESUS</u> says about how to approach people. He says to go and <u>STAY</u> with them. To <u>STAY</u> with someone means to spend <u>TIME</u> with them, to eat what they eat, do what they do, <u>DRESS</u> like they dress. To <u>CONNECT</u> with them.

<u>MOST</u> of the time, sharing our faith has <u>NOTHING</u> to do with <u>WORDS</u>. It's not about going door to door; it's simply <u>LIVING</u> our faith.

That's how the church <u>GREW</u> so <u>FAST</u> those first few hundred years. They <u>CARED</u> about people. They <u>TOOK</u> care of the people that everyone <u>ELSE</u> looked down on or ignored. They gave their time and their possessions to others, something <u>UNHEARD</u> of in the Roman world. They took <u>CHRIST'S EXAMPLE</u>, and <u>STARTED</u> with <u>COMPASSION</u>. These Christians were <u>DIFFERENT</u>. They had something people <u>WANTED</u>. People <u>NOTICED</u>.

Evangelism and missions have to be relational, something that happens in our <u>RELATIONSHIP</u> with other people. If we're going to <u>REACH</u> people, we need to <u>SHOW</u> them that we really <u>CARE</u>.

You know, there's no record of Jesus ever walking up to someone out the blue and saying: "I'm the Messiah" and <u>THEN</u> showing his care for them; he always <u>HELPED FIRST, CARED</u> for people <u>FIRST</u>, and <u>THEN</u> he revealed himself to them.

There's a wonderful legend about Saint Francis, the kindly thirteenth century monk. One day, he informed his brethren that he planned to go into the nearby village on a preaching mission. He invited a novice to go along. On their way, they passed an injured man, and Francis promptly stopped, saw to the poor fellow's needs and arranged medical care for him.

They went on, and soon passed a homeless man who was near starvation. Again, Francis stopped his journey and ministered to the hungry, homeless man.

So it went, throughout the day: people in need, Francis lovingly caring for them as best he could, until the sun was low in the sky. Then he told his novice friend it was time for them to return to the monastery for evening prayers. But the young man said, "Father, you said we were coming to town to preach to the people." Francis smiled. Then he said, "My friend, that's what we've been doing all day."

That's evangelism at its most faithful. Ministering to people in need. Not worrying about numbers, or converting people, or winning popularity. Evangelism is sharing the love of God in concrete ways to God's people.

Friends, don't worry about what you'll say. Like the saying goes, "Proclaim the Gospel at all times; if <u>NECESSARY</u>, use words."

Evangelism isn't a concept. It isn't about fancy words. Evangelism is <u>FIRST AND FOREMOST</u> about what you <u>DO</u>, the way you <u>LIVE</u>. The <u>WORDS</u> will come later.

Go and be apostles. <u>SHOW</u> someone that you really care. Invite them to church. God will do the rest. Amen.
